~ Christmas, 1864 ~

The Civil War saw its fourth Christmas in 1864. The soldiers on both sides understandably yearned for their homes and families.

Savannah Falls to Sherman!

On Dec. 22, Union Maj. Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman completed his 300-mile "March to the Sea" and captured the city of Savannah, Ga.

In a note sent to President Lincoln, Sherman wrote: "I beg to present you as a Christmas gift, the city of Savannah, with one hundred and fifty heavy guns and plenty of ammunition, and also about twentyfive thousand bales of cotton."

During his march through Georgia from Atlanta, Sherman employed a policy of "total war" aimed at bringing the conflict to the civilian population and undermining the South's will to fight. His soldiers destroyed farms and plantations, infrastructure, and other supplies or resources that could be used by the Confederate army. Sherman's troops, which were cut off from their own supply lines, met with relatively little resistance during their march through Georgia.

Lincoln responded to Sherman's note that he was "anxious, if not fearful" about the march across Georgia. "Now, the undertaking being a success, the honor is all yours," the President wrote Dec. 26.

Also in December 1864, Salmon P. Chase, former Secretary of the Treasury, was named the sixth Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. President Lincoln also called on Congress to reconsider the 13th Amendment abolishing slavery and asked for a tax increase to reduce the wartime debt.

Confederate Loss at Nashville

After his defeat at Franklin, Tenn., Confederate Gen. John Bell Hood continued to move his army toward Nashville, which was Union-occupied.



On Dec. 15, Union forces under Maj. Gen. George Thomas struck the right of the Confederate line. A few hours later, the Federals assaulted the left of the line as well. The Confederate left flank collapsed under similar attacks on Dec. 16, and Hood's army was forced to retreat.

The Battle of Nashville effectively destroyed the Confederate Army of Tennessee and Hood resigned his command after retreating to Mississippi.

Failed Assault on Ft. Fisher

On Dec. 23, Federal forces commanded by Maj. Gen. Benjamin Butler launched an assault on Fort Fisher, which guarded Wilmington, N.C., the South's last major seaport.



The Union navy began the attack by detonating a ship filled with powder, an attempt to destroy the fort that failed. Troops were then landed, but the land assault also was unsuccessful and the effort was scrapped by Butler on Dec. 27.

Medals Yanked!

In February 1862, Congress authorized the award of medals of honor to soldiers who distinguished themselves in battle.



In 1917, about one-third of the names honored with the medal were removed for not meeting the intended criteria. The vast majority removed (864 names) were from the 27th Maine, whose soldiers were awarded the medal for extending enlistments for four days during the Confederate invasion of Pennsylvania in 1863. None of those men actually saw combat at Gettysburg.
