The States During the Civil War

The 'Buckeye State'

Ohio entered the Union in 1803, the 17th state to ratify the U.S. Constitution. The "Buckeye State" was an important source of manpower to the Union cause and was the source of numerous military and political leaders, including five Federal officers who would later become U.S. Presidents. Still, due to connections with the South, it was politically divided.

In 1860, Ohio had 2,339,511 residents. Nearly 320,000 men from the Buckeye State served in the United States army, navy, and marines, with about 60 percent of its men of fighting age in service, the highest proportion of any state. About 5,000 of the Ohioans who served were free blacks. Buckeyes fought in most of the major battles of the war and suffered 35,475 total casualties, of which 6,835 were men killed in action.

'Buckeyes'

Ohio provided about 320 regiments of infantry and cavalry, 26 batteries of artillery, and five companies of sharpshooters to the Union cause. Units from the Buckeye State comprised one-fifth of the Federal army at Shiloh and suffered the highest casualty count at Chickamauga, with 3,591 men killed or wounded.

Among the notable units from Ohio were the 6th Regiment, nicknamed the "Guthrie Grays," and the 7th Regiment, the "Roosters." The latter lost about one-third of its men at Cedar Mountain, Va., in 1862. A few weeks later, at Second Bull Run, the 73rd Ohio lost more than half of the men engaged. Other regiments of note include the 10th Ohio, a unit of Irishmen who fought at Perryville, Ky., among other battles.

Although Ohio did not see any major engagements, in September 1862, Confederate Brig. Gen. Henry Heth threatened Cincinnati when he marched through northern Kentucky, but was turned back. The Buckeye State saw fighting in the summer of 1863, with John Hunt Morgan's cavalry raid. Ohio also was the site of Johnson's Island, a prisoner of war camp in Sandusky Bay.

Among the Buckeyes of note were Rep. Clement Vallandigham, a leading Peace Democrat, as well as Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton, Treasury Secretary Salmon P. Chase, and Union General-in-Chief Ulysses S. Grant. Other generals from Ohio included William T. Sherman, Philip H. Sheridan, James B. McPherson, George A. Custer, Rutherford B. Hayes, James A. Garfield, William S. Rosecrans, Don Carlos Buell, and Alexander M. McCook.

New Firearms Exhibit

A new exhibit of Civil War firearms has recently been unveiled at the Virginia Museum of the Civil War on the New Market battlefield. The collection is said to be the largest public exhibit of Civil War weaponry in Virginia.



The exhibit includes dozens of firearms donated to VMI by Martin Kaminsky in 2014 along with more than 100 items in the museum's possession but not previously displayed. Pieces include an Agar "coffee mill" machine gun and a LeMat revolver.

The Civil War Trust is seeking to preserve key ground at three battlefields in Virginia.



The targeted property includes 333 acres at Cedar Mountain where an August 1862 battle was fought, as well as land associated with the June 1862 battle of Gaines' Mill and the site of Fletcher's Redoubt at Cold Harbor.
