A graduate of the North Carolina School of the Arts, David Winslow began his fundraising career in 1978 as



head of the School's International Music Program Orchestra, working primarily in Italy and Germany. He later managed the School's fundraising efforts in North Carolina. Past and current Board affiliations include the national League of Historic American Theatres, SciWorks, the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Coalition on Drug and Alcohol Problems, the

North Carolina Governor's School Foundation, and the Semans Art Fund of the North Carolina School of the Arts.

Currently, David is also President of the North Carolina Civil War & Reconstruction History Center, having previously served as the project's senior consultant.

In Memoriam: Horace Mewborn, Jr.

We recently learned that noted Civil War author Horace Mewborn passed away on Dec. 14, 2019. Horace was an expert on the Confederate army cavalry battalion commander John Mosby, the "Gray Ghost".

Horace Mewborn, Jr., 78, was a native of NC. After graduating from Campbell College he served for seven years in the U.S. Army, with 30 months in Vietnam as



After leaving the army, he graduated from E. Carolina University and entered the FBI. Among his assignments with the FBI were tours of duty as a domestic terrorism specialist in New York City, Washington D.C., the Hostage Rescue Team, and FBI headquarters.

He co-authored the book on Mosby's command, the 43rd Battalion, Virginia Cavalry, Mosby's Command, for the H.E. Howard Virginia Regimental series, and he compiled and edited From Mosby's Command: Newspaper Letters & Articles by and about John S. Mosby and his Rangers, published by Butternut and Blue, Baltimore (2005).

Horace resided in New Bern, N.C, where he had been President of the New Bern Civil War Roundtable until he resigned last summer due to failing health (metastatic colon cancer). Dr. Ted Kunstling, President of the Raleigh CWRT, stated: "Horace was a good man and assisted greatly with Ed Bearss' visits to NC. He sometimes attended Ed's presentation to the Raleigh CWRT and then drove Ed down to New Bern for a presentation there."



The Three-Cornered War: The Union, the Confederacy, and Native Peoples in the Fight for the West

by Megan Kate Nelson

"In The Three-Cornered War Megan Kate Nelson reveals the fascinating history of the Civil War in the American West. Exploring the connections among the Civil War, the Indian wars, and western expansion, Nelson reframes the era as one of national conflict—involving not just the North and South, but also the West."



"Against the backdrop of this larger series of battles, Nelson introduces nine individuals. As we learn how these charismatic individuals fought for self-determination and control of the region, we also see the importance of individual actions in the midst of a larger military conflict. The Three-Cornered War is a captivating history—based on letters and diaries, military records and oral histories, and photographs and maps from the time—that sheds light on a forgotten chapter of

American history."

Author Megan Kate Nelson grew up in Littleton, Colorado, and is now a writer and historian living in Lincoln, Massachusetts.

She has written about the Civil War, U.S. western history,

academia, and American culture for the New York Times, Washington Post, Smithsonian Magazine, Preservation Magazine, Chronicle of Higher Education, and Civil War Times. She also writes a regular column on Civil War popular culture, Stereoscope, for Civil War Monitor.



Nelson earned her BA in history and literature from Harvard Univer-

sity and her PhD in American Studies from the University of Iowa, and she has taught at Texas Tech University, Cal State Fullerton, Harvard, and Brown. Nelson is the author of The Three-Cornered War, Ruin Nation, and Trembling Earth.



The Union Assaults at Vicksburg: Grant Attacks Pemberton, May 17–22, 1863

By Timothy B. Smith

After seven months and six attempts, Ulysses S. Grant was finally at the doorstep of Vicksburg in the third



week of May 1863. He proceeded to launch a series of attacks and maneuvers, intending to end the campaign quickly by assault, but the determined defense of Vicksburg's garrison changed his plans.

The Union Assaults at Vicksburg is the first comprehensive account of Ulysses S. Grant's quick attempt to capture Vicksburg, which proved critical to the Union's ultimate success and Grant's eventual solidification as one of the most significant military

commanders in American history.

Establishing a precise timeline for this crucial week, military historian Timothy B. Smith invites readers to follow the Vicksburg assaults as they unfold. His finely detailed account reaches from the offices of statesmen and politicians to the field of battle, with exacting analysis and insight that ranges from the highest level of planning and command to the combat experience of the common soldier. Smith's book also puts the sum of these battles into the larger context of the Vicksburg campaign, as well as the entire war.

Dr. Timothy B. Smith teaches history at the University of Tennessee at Martin. His many books include, most recently, Grant Invades Tennessee: The 1862 Battles for Forts Henry and Donelson as well as Corinth 1862: Siege, Battle, Occupation and Shiloh: Conquer or Perish, all published by the Univ. Press of Kansas.

Reviewer John F. Marszalek, Giles Distinguished Professor Emeritus of History and executive director and managing editor of the Ulysses S. Grant Presidential Library at Mississippi State University stated: "Tim Smith has done it again. His book on U. S. Grant's first attack on Vicksburg is another tour de force. There is no other historian who knows Civil War battles better than Smith, especially the conflict at Vicksburg. Civil War scholars and buffs are in for yet another excellent Timothy B. Smith battle account and can only await further books on this key battle."

Did You Know?

On Jan. 13, 1865, 155 years to the day prior to our Jan. 2020 meeting, a highly coordinated navy/army attack was begun on Fort Fisher, NC. Admiral Porter's extremely powerful Federal naval fleet, consisting of 627 guns in 59 vessels, began bombarding Fort Fisher at the mouth of the Cape Fear River. This produced the greatest firepower in world naval history up to that time. Simultaneously, 8,000 Union troops under Gen. Alfred Terry were successfully put ashore in small boats. Over a 3-day period, the navy fired some 20,000 projectiles which were much more effective than those of the failed attack in Dec. 1864.
