Feb. 10th Event Features Presentation by Richard Lewis on

Cloaked in Mystery: The Curious Case of the Confederate Coat

Our upcoming meeting will be on Monday, February 10, 2020 at 7:00 pm in Daniels Auditorium at the NC Museum of History in Raleigh and will feature a presentation by Richard Lewis on Cloaked in Mystery: The Curious Case of the Confederate Coat. Could it be that familiar and seemingly mundane studio images of Civil War generals hold a long-forgotten hidden



secret? A wrinkle in a sleeve sent Richard Lewis on a six-year research project that resulted in two articles in Civil War Times magazine and revealed a fascinating surprise. Not everything is as it seems in Civil War photography, even in pictures of well-known figures.

Richard uses an informative PowerPoint presentation to walk the

audience step-by-step through his discoveries, enabling them to play "history detective" along with him.

Richard Lewis is a native of Gulfport, Mississippi, and a graduate of Louisiana State University where he studied Civil War history under Pulitzer Prize winner Dr. T. Harry Williams. Richard served as Liaison to the Virginia Sesquicentennial of the Civil War Commission from 2010 to 2015 and is the former Marketing Director at Pamplin Historical Park.

Richard retired as the Director of Public Relations for the Virginia Tourism Corporation in 2016. He currently serves as a volunteer at Richmond National Battlefield Park and is secretary of Civil War Trails, Inc. Richard has published articles in Civil War Times and Hallowed Ground magazines. He has appeared multiple times on the History Channel.

Richard and his wife, Mary, reside in Richmond.

A vital clue uncovered by Richard Lewis in his intricate photo-sleuthing is the finely-tailored officer's coat of Confederate Major General Mansfield Lovell:

Bentonville Battlefield State Historic Site is the largest state historic site in North Carolina and hosts the largest reenactment event in the state every five years, this being one such year. This was the last major Confederate offensive of the war as General Joseph Johnston fought the advancing troops of General Sherman's march across the south. This living history event has many FREE programs and two battle reenactments which are ticketed events.

Raleigh CWRT Members Attend the 155th Anniversary Commemoration of the Second Battle of Ft. Fisher

Led by Dr. Ted Kunstling, President of the Raleigh CWRT, a group of Round Table members took a trip January 17-18, 2020 to the Wilmington, NC area to join in



the 155th Anniversary Commemoration of the Second Battle of Ft. Fisher. In addition to Ted and his wife Frances, the following members made the trip: Griff Bartlett, Bob Graesser, Jack Milani, Surry Roberts, and Josie Walker.

Arriving in Southport on the west bank of the mouth of the Cape Fear at noon on January 17, we had a delicious seafood lunch at Oliver's. From there, our first stop was at the Ft. Johnston Museum and Visitors Center, overlooking the mouth of the Cape Fear River and having



exhibits, original documents and historical artifacts about Fort Johnston on display. Fort Johnston was originally built by the British in 1749 to protect the region from Spanish and French attack. After 250 years of federal service as the oldest active-duty fort in the United States, Fort Johnston was conveyed to the City of Southport in 2006.

Our next stop was at Fort Anderson and Brunswick Town in Winnabow, NC. A major pre-Revolutionary port on North Carolina's Cape Fear River, Brunswick was razed by British troops in 1776 and never rebuilt.

During the Civil War, Fort Anderson was constructed atop the old village site, and served as part of the Cape

Fear River defenses below Wilmington before the fall of the Confederacy. Colonial foundations dot the present-day tour trail, which crosses the earthworks of the Confederate fort. Still existing are the ruins of the



St. Philips Anglican Church (shown above).

The local ferry being closed for repair, we drove upstream from Ft. Anderson, crossed the Cape Fear River and checked into the Hampton Inn at Carolina Beach. After freshening up, we capped off the evening with another outstanding seafood meal at The Pilot House in Wilmington.

The next morning, Jan. 18th, after breakfasting and checking out of the Hampton Inn, we made our way to Ft. Fisher. It is said that there were approximately 15,000 visitors at Ft. Fisher for the 150th commemoration of the Second Battle of Ft. Fisher. For the 155th event, the numbers were about one-tenth that, which made moving around the grounds relatively easy.

After several presentations about the battle, a group of Union reenactors simulated the breaching of the northern wall where the palisade joined the east bank of the Cape Fear River. The following photos were taken by Ted Kunstling, Bob Graesser, and Josie Walker.

With the fall of Ft. Fisher, Wilmington was doomed and would fall in a month. Less than two months after that, Confed. General Johnston surrendered to Union General Sherman at Bennett Place in Durham, NC. Finally, after hostilities across five Aprils, for all intents and purposes, the Civil War was over.

Did You Know?

On April 2, 1865, upon the Union Army breaking the siege of Petersburg, Jefferson Davis, his Cabinet, and the city's defenders evacuated Richmond, VA. The retreating soldiers, under orders, burned the bridges, armory, and warehouses. The fire spread, destroying most of Richmond. This was not the first time, however, that Richmond had been destroyed by fire in time of war. Of all people, it was the American Revolutionary War traitor, Benedict Arnold, newly minted as a British General, who sailed up the James River in January 1781 to attack Richmond. He defeated the weak defenders and burned most of Richmond to the ground. Eightly-four years later, it happened again.
