October 14th Event Features Wade Sokolosky Speaking on NC Confederate Hospitals in 1865

Our upcoming meeting will be on Monday, October 14, 2019 at 7:00 pm in Daniels Auditorium at the NC Museum of History in Raleigh and will feature a presentation by historian Wade Sokolosky on the subject NC Confederate Hospitals in 1965.

A native of Beaufort, North Carolina, Colonel Wade Sokolosky, U.S. Army (Retired), is a graduate of East Carolina



University and a 25-year veteran. He is one of North Carolina's leading experts of the 1865 Carolinas Campaign. Wade has lectured throughout the Carolinas, speaking to roundtables, various societies and organizations, and at historical sites.

He is the co-author (with Mark A. Smith) of the following:

- To Prepare for Sherman's Coming: The Battle of Wise's Forks, March 1865
- No Such Army Since the Days of Julius Caesar: Sherman's Carolinas Campaign from Fayetteville to Averasboro

Wade is the author of the following:

- Final Roll Call: Confederate Losses during the Carolinas Campaign
- Kiss Him for His Mother: North Carolina's Confederate Hospitals during the Civil War's Final Months

Long-term, Wade is working on a book-length study of the Confederate Army of Tennessee during the Civil War's final months in the Carolinas. He is the recipient of the Raleigh Civil War Round Table's 2017 T. Harry Gatton Award for his important efforts to study, preserve, and share the Civil War heritage of his native North Carolina. Additionally, Wade serves as the vice president of the Friends of Bentonville Battlefield Association.

Historian Michael C. Hardy has identified 13 Confederate general hospitals located in NC during the Civil War. These were usually large structures, sometimes occupying existing buildings, like Peace College in Raleigh, or at times, new structures, like the

500-bed facility at the fairgrounds in Charlotte.

One of these, a 200 bed hospital, known as General Hospital No. 4, was located at Dock and S. Front St. in Wilmington, NC. It operated as an army hospital throughout the Civil War until the fall of Wilmington to Federal troops on Feb-22-1865. Patient records can be found at http://www.onhgs.org/confedhospintro.htm.

Other large facilities were located in Fayetteville, Goldsboro, Salisbury, Wake Forest, and Wilson.

Smaller, temporary hospitals—often run by local women and known as "Wayside Hospitals"—sprang up along railroad lines.

Braxton Bragg: Mexican War Hero

Although he emerged from the Civil War with a reputation as one of the Confederacy's less than stellar commanders, Braxton Bragg was once lauded as a military



hero. His actions at the Battle of Buena Vista (Feb. 22-23, 1847) during the Mexican War were credited with turning the tide of battle in favor of Gen. Zachary Taylor's army and played no small part in catapulting Taylor to the White House.

Bragg was born March 22, 1817, in Warrenton, NC, and graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1837. He was commissioned a lieutenant in the artillery and was sent to Florida where he partici-

pated in the Seminole War. Illness contracted in the swamps of Florida sent him home for a lengthy recovery. In the mid-1840s he nearly destroyed his own career with several articles highly critical of Army leadership published in the popular Southern Literary Messenger. He was court-martialed and found guilty of disrespect to superior officers; but war with Mexico offered the chance to remove, or at least lessen, the stain on his record.

Then-Captain Bragg initially commanded Battery E, 3rd Artillery, when he went to Mexico with Taylor's army (his lieutenants were George H. Thomas and John F. Reynolds). He was transferred to command Battery C, 3rd Artillery, after its commander was fatally injured in a fall after the Battle of Monterrey in late September 1846.

Following a temporary cessation of hostilities after Monterrey it appeared that the war was over. But President James Polk and Gen. Winfield Scott wanted a knock-out blow – Scott would strip Taylor's army to reinforce a new column to move under Scott's own command against Mexico City. Bragg and his artillery were among the small force to be left with Taylor, which also included the 1st Mississippi Rifles under Taylor's son-in-law Col. Jefferson Davis. Mexican Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna – he of the Alamo notoriety – sensed an opportunity to crush Taylor's weakened army and moved against him at Buena Vista.

Taylor's army of approximately 4,500 men was outnumbered about 4:1 by Santa Anna's force. When a Mexican attack seemed poised to break the American lines, Bragg's artillery appeared to plug a gap and poured round after round into the enemy infantry at nearly point

-blank range, causing the enemy ranks to break. Bragg estimated that his guns fired some 250 rounds during the battle.

According to a popular story, Taylor is said to have appeared at Bragg's guns at this time and questioned what ammunition Bragg was employing. Upon being



told he was firing canister, Taylor supposedly remarked, "A little more grape, Captain Bragg." Witnesses present denied that any such exchange occurred (and it is extremely unlikely that the highly excitable and sometimes profane Taylor would have had such a calm reaction in the heat of battle), but the phrase was widely repeated, making Braxton Bragg a household name.

In recognition of his exploits at Buena Vista, his hometown of Warrenton gave him a presentation sword, engraved with a quote about Bragg's actions



from Taylor's official report of Buena Vista: "The first discharge of canister caused the enemy to hesitate, the second and third drove him back in disorder and saved the day." This sword is the only item belonging to Braxton Bragg in the NC Museum of History collection.



Did You Know?

This month's lecture dealt with NC hospitals in the Civil War. Due to the Northern blockade of Southern ports, one commodity in short supply in the South was medicine, specifically morphine for pain and quinine to counter the effects of malaria.

It is said that around 900,000 Northern troops contracted malaria during the conflict. The number of affected Southern troops is not well-documented but, due to the scarcity of a reliable supply of quinine, must have been staggering. Quinine's mode of action is unknown.

The primary source of these drugs was Europe and the main method of obtaining them was through smuggling. In order to get the drugs past the Union blockade, the medicine would be packed inside the hollowed papier-mache heads of dolls. If stopped, the Union troops rarely bothered to examine or confiscate toys since they were focused on more obvious contraband.

The Raleigh Civil War Round Table was formed on March 12, 2001 and is a 501(c)(3) "tax exempt organization."
