# September 9<sup>th</sup> Event Features Amy Bauer Speaking on the 135<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment United States Colored Troops

Our upcoming meeting will be on Monday, September 9, 2019 at 7:00 pm in Daniels Auditorium at the NC Museum of History in Raleigh and will feature Amy Bauer speaking on the 135<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment U.S. Colored Troops. This will be preceded at 6:30 pm by a social half-hour. N.B.: it's time for annual membership dues.

Amy Bauer was raised on an island outside of Savannah, GA where she learned to appreciate and value history.



The rich historic roots of Savannah exposed her to the work of genealogy and has kept her intrigued enough to have worked in the field for over thirty years. Her husband, Jay,

shares her interest in genealogy. They are a military family. Jay served as an army Captain pilot, flying "bird dog" missions in Vietnam. Jay's brother is buried in Arlington National Cemetery and their nephew graduated from West Point. Jay was a construction manager in Los Angeles for 40 years while Amy has been an independent insurance broker for over 30 years.

In 2013, Jay retired and they relocated from California to Goldsboro, NC to become involved with Preservation NC, where they spent several years preserving the house that has become their retirement home. There they continued their avocations as local historians, preservationists, and genealogists. In 2014, Amy and Jay attended a history talk at the Wayne County Public in Goldsboro. The lecture hinted that a troop of African-Americans called the 135<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment United States Colored Troops (USCT) had been raised in Goldsboro in the final month of the Civil War.

This rumor piqued Amy and Jay's interest. Their research soon led them to the National Archives in Washington, DC, where they discovered the lost history of the

135<sup>th</sup> USCT written in pension records. Over a four-year period, they continued to research these records. They also visited the Library of Congress a half-dozen times as well as a number of graveyards, collecting information to aid them in tracking down living descendants.

Over this period, Amy and Jay have analyzed close to 300 pension records, have done genealogies on 1,100 of these men and have tracked down over 100 of their descendant families. They continue to find more descendants every day as they continue to lecture on the 135<sup>th</sup> USCT. Recently, they had an interested audience of over 300.

During their research, Amy and Jay learned the genesis of the 135<sup>th</sup> USCT. Sherman's March-to-the-Sea and March through the Carolinas required manpower to move 60,00 troops, supply wagons, artillery, and ambulances. To this end, Sherman employed liberated slaves to cut trees for corduroy roads, and to erect bridges and causeways. These liberated slaves were known as the "Pioneer Corps". Once Sherman reached Goldsboro, they were given uniforms and organized into the 135<sup>th</sup> USCT. A total of 1,154 men made up this "lost troop".

In a move to demonstrate their commitment to this project, Jay and Amy formed the 135<sup>th</sup> USCT, a 501 (c)(3) non-profit organization comprised of dedicated volunteers. Jay serves as President while Amy serves as Vice President of the organization.

The organization's members include many of the living descendants of the 135<sup>th</sup> USCT, along with prominent Civil War historians, such as Earl Ijames from the North Carolina Museum of History, UNC's Dr. Reginald Hildebrand, Dr. Ben Speller from NCCU, and Dr. Malcom Beech from Washington D.C. The commission has gained strong support from the local and state community and has produced a Civil War living history weekend each of the past few years in Goldsboro, NC.

Amy attended Georgia Southern University. She and Jay have two daughters and seven grandchildren.



### **Back to School:**

## Best Universities/Colleges for an Online Bachelor's Degree in History

A reader of the Raleigh Civil War Round Table website sent this editor an email message recently. She wanted to know if I could add a link to the website of the University where she worked. Specifically, she wanted to promote her University's online bachelor's degree program in History.



She pointed out that people interested in the Civil War might be interested in History, especially American History, in general. Furthermore, online degrees offer maximum flexibility for working adults and retired seniors, the same demographic that makes up the vast majority of our Civil War Round Table membership. "Flexibility" denotes the fact that most online programs allow a student to start at any time and to work at their own pace.

It is also possible that these online History programs offer the possibility of demonstrating proficiency in a course by passing an online test and, thereby, not having to take the course. Credits from course work already taken at other institutions, in-person or online, are also sometimes transferable.

Rather than simply posting a link to the correspondent's University, I decided to scour the web for top 25 lists of online Universities/Colleges where others have already done the legwork of gathering the data and generating the rankings based on stated criteria. Presented on page 3 is my collation of four such linked lists of rankings. Out of respect to the reader who was instrumental in piquing my interest in this subject, I have listed her school, Maryville University in St. Louis, MO first, even though it didn't appear in any of the four lists.

Four sources went into the table I created for Best Universities/Colleges for an Online Bachelor's Degree in History:

BC = BestColleges.com

**BS** = TheBestSchools.org

BV = BestValueSchools.com (ranked only by cost)

**US** = USNews.com

**Table Key: NR** = Not Ranked; ? = Info not available

A full course load leading to an online bachelor's degree in History typically requires 120 credit hours. Since North Carolina is not mentioned on any of the lists, I am limiting the following discussion of cost to out-of-state tuition. Out-of-state per-credit costs for an online bachelor's degree in History typically range from \$190 to \$575. Therefore, students should expect to pay between a best case of \$22,800 and a worst case of \$69,000 in total tuition for the equivalent of a four year education. The average of those extremes would be \$45,900.

Where a specific dollar amount of out-of-state cost per credit hour was not given, a relative rating system, if available, where "\$" is least expensive and "\$\$\$\$" is most expensive was used instead. Since one would be pursuing the degree online from home, there would be no additional room and board expenses beyond what one is already experiencing.

In comparison, <u>here</u> is a breakdown of the average tuition cost of four full years (120 credit hours) of attending college in person:

Public four-year (in-state): \$39,880 Public four-year (out-of-state): \$102,480

Private four-year: \$138,960

So, the average online out-of-state cost of \$45,900 for a bachelor's degree in History is a bargain compared to the in-person costs. The high cost of education is having an effect on the long-term survival of Universities/ Colleges in the U.S. A CBS report today stated that 25% of all Universities/Colleges are expected to close over the next 20 years. This is disheartening because one advantage in-person attendance in a place of higher learning bestows is valuable socialization skills, skills not learned online.

Of all the listings in the table on page 3, only Park University offers a specific online bachelor's degree in military history. Other than that, Southern New Hampshire University is the only one to offer an online bachelor's history degree with a concentration in military history. The others offer an online bachelor's degree in history with the option for a concentration in American history.

Considering all factors, including being highly rated by all four rating sources, having a relatively moderate cost, and a relatively high graduation rate, the best institution for receiving an online out-of-state bachelor's degree is Oregon State University in Corvallis. The University of Central Florida in Orlando and the University of Illinois at Springfield rank second and third, respectively.


#### A Synopsis of the Book

#### **Did You Know?**

Only four members of the Confederate cabinet of Jefferson Davis remained in their position for the entire 1861-1865 duration of the Civil War:

President Jefferson Davis Vice President Alexander H. Stephens Secretary of the Navy Stephen Mallory Postmaster General John H. Reagan

On the other hand, the secessionists had successions of three Secretaries of State, three Secretaries of the Treasury, five Secretaries of War, and four Attorneys General.
